Duties: Assisted in administrative and supervisory duties of the game management staff in a 12-county area. Supervised all biological research in the area. Acted for the supervisor in his absence. Public relations and educational work. Prepared conservation management plans for state areas and public forest areas. Worked closely with public forest administrators, and state foresters on the development of multiple-use programs. From May 1952 to February 1953 I acted as area game supervisor in charge of game activities in the area which included supervision of professional game managers, foresters, and aides. Emphasis was on incorporating game management work into other types of land use, such as forestry, recreation and private land management.

1954 - 1955

I took a one-year leave of absence to accept a fellowship at Harvard University. The program provided me with broad training in land use, economics, conservation and planning. Intensive work was done in economics, public administration, public policy, and resource management. The program core was a seminar in conservation and land use which consisted of faculty members from various Harvard departments: law, economics, planning, and government. (Professors John Gaus, John D. Black, John Kenneth Galbraith, Ayers Brinser, Charles M. Haar, Arthur Maas)

Title: Federal Aid Coordinator, Madison, Wisconsin

Duties: Responsible for the administration of the state fish and game federal aid program (approximately one million dollars annually at that time) including program execution and reimbursement, supervision of land appraiser, accountants, and special staff. In addition, the following duties were performed.

1. Coordinated the state wetlands acquisition and public hunting and fishing grounds program.
2. Supervised Madison staff on programs designed to encourage private investment in wildlife as a use of land.
3. Department coordinator on matters relating to land use planning and zoning. I worked with state planning officials on planning and zoning matters and coordinated fish, game forestry, and recreational interests within the department.
4. Department coordinator for the orderly development of lands along the Upper Mississippi River Fish and Wildlife Refuge, which included cooperation with the Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.
5. Liaison with federal agencies on the following programs; Agricultural Conservation, Soil Bank, Soil Conservation Service, Small Watersheds Act (P.L. 566).

Employed on July 1, 1961 as a Recreation Specialist, (later Resource Specialist) in the Department of Resource Development.

In 1962, I was appointed by the Governor as Director of the Department and served in that capacity during a portion of 1962. On reappointment of the former Director, I qualified for the career civil service position of Deputy Director.

As a recreation specialist and later as a resource specialist, my duties consisted of the following:

1. Provide advice and assistance to the recreation industry. Survey the facilities and needs of the recreation industry. Assist in planning programs designed to promote the tourist and recreation advantages of the state.
2. Work with University of Wisconsin faculty members on recreation research and extension programs.
3. Work closely with other agencies in the recreation and resource field. Make recommendations as to the protection and development of the state's resources.
4. Maintain a clearing house of materials related to recreation and resources. Write articles and give speeches on resources and planning. Assist and develop regional and statewide land and water-use plan.
5. Secretary, State Recreation Committee and statutory member of the committee which was charged with the coordination of the Wisconsin ten-year \$50 million Resource Development and Outdoor Recreation Act. I also assisted on the staff work necessary to develop this program. The Governor served as the chairman.
6. Secretary, Natural Resources Committee of State Agencies, an 18-member statutory interagency committee charged with the responsibility of coordination of state resource programs. The Governor served as chairman.
7. Secretary, Mississippi River Parkway Planning Commission, a statutory committee charged with the responsibility of developing a coordinated program for the development of the Wisconsin section of the Great River Road.
8. Formulated and administered the state's first metropolitan open space aid program.
9. Served in an advisory capacity to the Wisconsin Federal Surplus Property Development Commission.
10. Kept informed of legislation at the state and federal level on resource matters and provided the Director and the Governor with analyses and recommendations on such legislation.
11. Prepared legislation on resource matters related to the work of the department, the State Recreation Committee, the Natural Resources Committee and state agencies, and for the Governor's office.
12. Participated in the development of the Wisconsin State Plan. Directed recreation phase of the Wisconsin Plan.

As Director of the Department, I supervised the following divisions.

1. Division of Planning
2. Division of Industrial Development
3. Division of Recreation
4. Division of Ports.

The Department has responsibilities in four major fields; 1) resource development, 2) planning, 3) promotion, and, 4) intergovernmental cooperation and assistance.

As Deputy Director, the above duties were continued and, in addition, the following:

1. Acted for the Director in the Director's absence.
2. Served as the chief administrative arm of the Director on all matters relating to the department's programs.
3. Was chief administrative officer in charge of budgets, budget control, internal administrative and organizational functions, personnel officer, etc.

The position, "Regional Coordinator, Upper Mississippi-Western Great Lakes Area," is described in brief as follows: Under the general direction of the Resources Program Staff, the incumbent serves as a top field representative for the Office of the Secretary with latitude for the exercise of independent judgment in his assignment as Regional Coordinator of the upper Mississippi-Western Great Lakes Area. He has a major responsibility for coordination and review of overall departmental programs and policies in the development, planning and operating stages as distinguished and apart from the administrative responsibilities of the bureaus."

"The Coordinator represents the Office of the Secretary of the Interior on matters requiring Departmental coordination. (there are ten agencies of the Department which have responsibilities in the five-state area.) In addition, he works with other Federal, State and local agencies and universities on resource development

and conservation programs and represents the Department before these agencies on matters involving Interior agencies. He serves as Interior's representative on the comprehensive river basin planning studies now under way under the aegis of the Water Resources Council, and represents the Department on boards and committees of the International Joint Commission."

The Coordinator is co-chairman of the North Central Field Committee of the U.S. Department of the Interior, which consists of regional directors of the agencies of the Department having responsibilities in this area.

Some of the assignments and responsibilities were as follows:

1. The Secretary of the Interior nominated me to serve as a member of the International Joint Commission Great Lakes Water Level Reference Board. This nomination was ratified by the representatives of the U.S. and Canada.
2. Represent the Department on the Grand River (Michigan), Big Muddy (Illinois) and Upper Mississippi Rivers Comprehensive Basin Studies.
3. Serve as an alternate to the Departmental representative on the President's Quetico-Superior Committee which is concerned with management problems common to the Minnesota-Ontario boundary.
4. Represent the Department on the Great Lakes Commission, an eight state "compact" concerned with management and development of the Great Lakes.
5. Serve as the task force chairman and coordinator for the Department on proposed National areas in the Northern Great Lakes Region; proposed Apostle Islands National Lakeshore, and Grand Portage Indian Park; member joint USDA-USDI task force on the St. Croix-Namekagon Wild and Scenic Rivers Study.
6. Represent the Department on the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission, a Federal-State commission dealing with economic development problems, established under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965.

In August, 1967, President Lyndon B. Johnson nominated me as Alternate Federal Co-chairman for the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission. This nomination was confirmed by the U.S. Senate in September, 1967. As the Alternate Federal Co-chairman, I acted in behalf of the Federal Co-chairman on matters relative to the work of the Commission. In 1968 and 1969, upon the resignation of the Federal Co-chairman, I assumed the duties of that office. The Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission was authorized under Title V of the 1965 Public Works and Economic Development Act. The Commission consists of the governors of the states of Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin and the Federal Co-chairman. The Commission area includes a 119 county area in the northern portions of those states. The Commission was broadly conceived and executed. The primary thrust was economic development in an area which has experienced economic decline for more than four decades. This Federal-State Commission involved working with all levels of government, the Bureau of the Budget, the Federal Advisory Council on Regional Economic Development, members of Congress and Congressional Committees, State Legislators and the like.

In 1967 I accepted a position as Associate Professor, Department of Urban and Regional Planning and chairman, Community and Natural Resource Development, University Extension (on leave 1967-1969).

Extension responsibilities (1969-1974) included the leadership, administrative and coordination role for more than forty state specialists in the following units and departments: Wildlife Ecology, Landscape Architecture, Forestry, Agriculture Economics, Soil and Water Conservation unit, Geological and National History Survey, Environmental Resources Unit (established during my
