Leo Nickasch, Lakeview maintenance, is program chairman of the Arbor Day activities in the Twin Cities. 18,000 trees, in plastic bags, will be distributed to the public and parochial schools of Neenah and Menasha. Each child will receive a tree with planting instructions. The trees are 4-year-old American Arborvitae, commonly known as White Cedar. The trees are a symbol of continued growth in this year's Twin Cities Centennial. 10,000 "I Planted A Tree" buttons will also be distributed.

A four page publication entitled "Learn to Love Trees" will also be issued to the children in an effort to teach them about the forests in a new indepth way. Articles included in the publication are: the importance of wood, trees and our environment, trees for recreation, etc.

The success of this year's Arbor Day program was made possible through contributions from 11 different community groups: unions, industry, clubs and organizations.

The local paper carried a picture of Thelma Johnson and Millie Damon, bagging trees for distribution. Thelma and Millie are Neenah Mill Life Members and members of the American Association of Retired Persons. So nice to see one of the many ways our retirees can get involved in community activities.
