

• During this month teams of Conservation Department technicians will visit some 80 high schools. This is the sixth winter the program has been carried on in the northern and central counties of the state. In the southern counties the program is presented to the teacher training institutions.

• The wildlife exhibit which was sponsored by the Industrial Committee of the Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce in connection with the dedication of the Conservation Department's new area head-

quarters building was visited by 20 schools of 2,650 students. The exhibit was set up on the grounds next to the new headquarters building and included a display of live fish as well as wild mammals and birds.

Summer Conservation Workshop Scheduled

For the 12th year, Wisconsin state colleges are sponsoring a unique conservation course. Interest and attendance have grown over the years.

The 1957 summer conservation workshop for teachers has been set for June 16 to July 21. The workshop, now in its 12th year, is sponsored by all of Wisconsin's state colleges. Six credits can be earned in five weeks as the session is operated on a six-day week. This summer college will again be held at the famous Trees for Tomorrow camp located on the shores of Eagle river in

Vilas county.
